Texas Core Curriculum

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (Coordinating Board) revised the Texas Core Curriculum (TCC) rules in October 2011, with implementation of the rules in the fall 2014 semester. The Coordinating Board based the revisions on the recommendations of the <u>Undergraduate Education Advisory Committee</u> (UEAC), which is comprised of faculty members from Texas public community colleges and universities.

Elements of the Texas Core Curriculum

The TCC is a 42 Semester Credit Hour (SCH) core curriculum for all undergraduate students in Texas. The <u>elements of the TCC</u> include a statement of purpose, six core objectives, and nine common component areas.

Students have flexibility to choose courses from an institution's core curriculum. However, that flexibility may be limited by the student's major. For example, most science majors have prescribed math and science requirements as part of their degree program requirements. Students should always consult with an academic advisor or counselor at their institution to determine what courses they should take.

Texas Core Curriculum List of Courses

All public institution have an approved list of courses as part of their core curriculum of the TCC. Courses are approved on an annual basis for each academic year, starting with the fall semester. The list of courses, starting with the fall 2014 semester is available online at the Texas General Education Core Curriculum WebCenter.

The Texas Core Curriculum Submission Portal

Texas public higher education institutions may change or make revisions to their TCC once a year. The request for change must be made through the online portal available at the <u>Core Curriculum Submission</u> Portal.

Instructions on how to make a revision to the TCC, including a timeline to consider, are posted on the page Core Curriculum Submission and Approval Process .
